**A mixture of tools made from flint and chert**

**Bone Needle**  
Used for sewing fabric and leather items.



**Flint Scraper**  
Mainly used in the preparation of animal skins, to remove fatty layers from the underside of the hide.



**Flint Piercer/Awl**  
Used to make small holes in wood, bone or antler items, as well as leather goods prior to sewing.



**Small flint axe head**  
A flaked axe head which would have had a wooden haft and used for carpentry work.



**Flint Leaf arrowhead**  
A common style of arrow used for hunting.

Bone Needle

Used for sewing fabric and leather items.



Flint Scraper

Mainly used in the preparation of animal skins, to remove fatty layers from the underside of the hide.



Flint Piercer/Awl

Used to make small holes in wood, bone or antler items, as well as leather goods prior to sewing.



Flint sickle

Used in harvest crops, particularly grains such as wheat and barley.



Flint Leaf arrowhead

A common style of arrow used for hunting.



Chert Knife (Hafted)

An essential tool used for many everyday uses.

**A selection of objects from the Bronze Age**

Flint knife (Hafted)

A design commonly used by the Beaker Culture of the Early Bronze Age.

**OR**

Copper Knife Blade

Based on finds from the "Amesbury Archer" Beaker Culture burial.



Bronze pin

A ring headed, swan neck pin, used to fasten clothing during the later Bronze Age and early Iron Age.



Flint barbed and tanged arrowhead

A more complicated design of arrow used for hunting during the Bronze Age.



Gold Ring

Based on an original found in Cambridgeshire, it dates to about 1200-1000 BC. These rings were probably threaded onto a gold torc and worn around the neck.



Amber Bead

Amber was a popular material for making beads throughout the Bronze Age, as it is quite soft and easy to drill and carve.

Flint knife (Hafted)

A design commonly to the Beaker Culture of the Early Bronze Age.



Bone harpoon head

Bone and antler harpoons have been found in Britain dating back at least as far as the Mesolithic.



Antler hammer

A tool used in the manufacture of flint implements.

**Iron Reaping Hook**

Small reaping hook/sickle on an ash shaft, used to harvest crops and maintain trees/hedgerows.



**Bronze pin**

A ring headed, swan neck pin, used to fasten clothing during the later Bronze Age and early Iron Age.



**Iron snips**

An early form of scissors dating from the Iron Age. A larger version was used for shearing sheep.



**Iron Currency Bar**

Hand forged 12" long iron age currency bar made from low carbon steel based on the find from Meon Hill Iron Age hill fort

**Iron Reaping Hook**

Small reaping hook/sickle on an ash shaft, used to harvest crops and maintain trees/hedgerows.



**Iron Pin**

A square section pin with tapered square section shaft and a spatulate terminal with brass ring, used to fasten clothing during the later Iron Age.



**Iron snips**

An early form of scissors dating from the Iron Age. A larger version was used for shearing sheep.



**Iron Currency Bar**

Hand forged 12" long iron age currency bar made from low carbon steel based on the find from Meon Hill Iron Age hill fort



**Iron Knife (Hafted)**

A basic tool dating from the Iron Age.



**Iron Adze**

Based on the adze from Danebury Ring Iron Age site. A tool used in woodworking.
